Mechanics of Vote by Mail Balloting

Last month, we discussed how mail-in voting is becoming more popular and addressed some concerns about its security.

This month, let's discuss the mechanics of mail-in voting. Included in this, we'll talk about how mail-in voting is safe for the individual and how VBM (vote by mail) could help prevent voting fraud when the process is followed.

Many think VBM should be eliminated. That issue needs to be dealt with by our lawmakers. Right now, VBM is happening. We can't avoid VBM and win elections. Good or bad mail voting is here now.

Mail voting (and early voting) has many advantages over Election Day voting.

First, it "banks" your vote. Avoid the chance of lines, "printer errors", bad weather and a long list of possible excuses people seem to make.

Second, it's perhaps the easiest and less stressful way to vote as you can do it at your leisure and even stop and do research between each filling of a "bubble" — you can take your time to double-check later before you seal the envelope.

Third, it is safe when done correctly. Here's how.

The steps are easy and start with you requesting a ballot at https://www.votebrevard.gov/Ballots-by-Mail/Request-A-Mail-Ballot. You will have to provide the last 4 digits of your SSN; that's a new security feature. Call the Supervisor of Elections (SOE) if you have trouble.

When your ballot arrives, vote, but remember to READ the instructions when sealing your ballot.

The first step is to put your ballot in a "security" envelope, and the last is to sign your name over the envelope's seal. READ THE INSTRUCTIONS

You can mail your vote; the ballot is marked "postage prepaid". Alternatively, you can take the ballot to any SOE office or early voting location and place it in a secure drop-box. NOTE: You <u>cannot</u> drop off your mail ballot at your voting location on Election Day. You can still drop it off at a SOE office. It must be in their office before 7pm, but seriously <u>DO NOT WAIT THAT LONG!</u>

An essential feature of voting by mail is getting an update on the status of your ballot. Go to the SOE website https://www.votebrevard.gov/Ballots-by-Mail/Check-My-Mail-Ballot-Status. That's important. If there is a problem with your ballot, including your signature, the SOE will try to contact you. But take responsibility and check to see it's received; wait two days, then check to verify the ballot was accepted. Its two different checks.

Once your signature is matched, your ballot is counted. You're done!

Lastly, anytime you are near your SOE office (when you drop off your ballot), go in and check and update your signature. It has probably changed over the decades since you first did it

Try voting by mail. It's a good way to vote and the easiest to accomplish, given the amount of time you have from start to finish. If you think you will be traveling, or may be providing care to a relative, or unable to vote in person, request a mail-in ballot. If circumstances change, you can still vote in person. Just bring your unused mail ballot to you voting location and the election clerk will "spoil" it for you.
