## Citizen Call to Action, Wayne Twiddy

It's not an overstatement to say that 2024 will be a year of consequence when it comes to elections. Three times during 2024 the citizens of Brevard County will be asked to cast their vote: (1) the Presidential Preference Primary March 19, (2) the Primary Election August 20, and (3) the General Election November 5. Brevard's Supervisor of Elections Tim Bobanic has stated that the duration of the 2024 elections, from when the first ballots are sent out until the last ballots are counted, will cover 155 days.

It's troubling to know non-citizens, either wittingly or not, have slipped through Florida's election system to vote in our most recent elections. Our representatives in Tallahassee have known about this issue for years yet their inactivity to enforce the Florida statutes reveals their unwillingness to stop it. During each of the past three legislative sessions major election integrity bills passed however none have addressed the citizenship verification issue. When a non-citizen votes in Florida elections it is the Florida citizen that is disenfranchised. The bottom line is if you, as a U.S Citizen, don't speak out to your representatives in Tallahassee about this issue, it will continue in 2024. With millions more non-citizens in Florida due to illegal immigration one can only imagine the scope.

If we're not able to change the trajectory of our country in 2024 then we stand to lose what we love so much about our country. You can do something about it — use your agency to contact the legislative leaders in Tallahassee and ask them to require citizenship to be verified and remove those non-citizens from the current voter rolls.
